

Why Europe?

In 2023, Europe faced the most extreme heatwave in recent history whilst confronting an immense energy crisis and a war on its doorstep. This presented an obstacle to the continent's Green Deal agenda, as political challenges and concerns about the cost of living competed for priority.

There are barriers to reaching broad segments of society, a need for more context-specific knowledge, and combating harmful narratives on the transition to a decarbonized, biodiversity-friendly economy. While the European institutional landscape is home to some of the oldest and most prestigious agriculture and forest research institutions, there is a need for applied research organizations that deliver scalable solutions for landuse transformation.

Europe is just beginning a new policy era that does not penalize farmers for having trees. Landscape thinking and landscape approaches are mostly absent. At CIFOR-ICRAF, our experience, knowledge, and partnerships on landscape approaches and nature-based solutions across various Global South countries – many of which have struggled with climate change impacts for years – are now highly relevant.

Our new directorate allows for a new leverage point from which to feed insights from our partners into European discourse to improve functioning and support and mitigate negative effects before they emerge, given that actions in Europe have direct consequences for the Global South through business ties and policies affecting countries and people.

The European Union Corporate Sustainability Reporting Directive compels large companies and public-interest entities to disclose information on their ESG performance annually. Under the Regulation on Deforestation-Free Products, any operator or trader who places commodities on the European Union market, or exports from it, must prove these do not originate from recently-deforested land or contribute to forest degradation. The European Union's Renewable Energy Directive triggered the massive expansion and investments into oil palm and is fueling the debate about the sustainability of woody biomass.

We add value through our unique perspective and our experience bridging farmer-researcher divides.

Technically, this includes using our Option by Context approach, recognizing diversity, and choosing components (eg. tree species) to meet specific conditions. Process-wise, it involves researchers, farmers, and activists working closely together, supporting farmers to learn and embedding research in an action framework. These lessons and practices have been learned through 40+ years of work in the Global South.

We leverage our expert networks and extensive forest restoration and afforestation knowledge to support our partners in Europe to develop a blueprint for the future forest of Europe supporting climate change adaptation and mitigation, but also preservation of Europe's cultural and ecological landscapes.

We are experienced in creating immersive outreach communications to connect with all stakeholders, convening transformative digital and inperson events, strategically linking the European Union directorate programs to European events, facilitating multi-stakeholder engagements, and providing multimedia communications advice and services. With the GLF secretariat hosted in Bonn at the European directorate, we have access to a powerful platform with 33 charter members, which is already well recognized and harnessed by the governments of Luxembourg and Germany to support their ambitions. Opportunities include connecting with the GLF Youth in Landscapes initiative's 60,000+ youth and tapping into CIFOR-ICRAF's knowledge, data and capacity development and GLF's Landscapes Academy to access and develop learning programs and courses.
